

Immigration Letter:

The Jubilee Year that Pope Francis initiated on December 24 is to be a time of hope for all people, including immigrants and refugees. Our call as Franciscans is to manifest the light of Christ in a way they can see and touch. Our Church was built on a rock. Her positions on immigration are centered in Christ's teaching, and should be understood as a basis for loving action. The Southwest bishops issued a statement recently. At a webinar, Bishop Mark Seitz of El Paso, said: "Our solidarity really must go beyond words in order to be credible." There are many actions we can take to express our solidarity, within the law and the realm of charity. A number of our regions and fraternities already include care for immigrants in their active apostolates. If not, depending on geographic location, possible areas of service could include:



- Helping provide humanitarian assistance for newly arrived immigrants, whose legal status may vary.
- Providing legal, economic, and social support to asylum seekers awaiting a court hearing.
- Sponsoring a newly arrived refugee family (with legal status) who has been placed in your area by a resettlement agency or intergovernmental partner such as Catholic Charities.
- Accompanying undocumented longtime residents, who are experiencing fear and uncertainty.
- Participating in public advocacy at the national, state, or local level to pass just legislation.
