Post-Election JPIC Message:

While many are satisfied with the outcome, we know well that a good number are hurting. It bears repeating, we don't bring partisan politics into fraternity at any level. For those who grieve, we are blessed to have a reliable strategy, practiced by both Jesus and Francis, of going off to a quiet place for time with God. For me, music is also helpful. I like to put on Oliver Muktudzi's *"Hear me Lord,"* and let the tears flow. We are contemplatives first. We seek that place of pure love, where there is forgiveness of everyone for everything, where there is no fear, and no anger. Whatever is worthily done for peace and justice and human dignity and creation must start from there, as required in our Rule of Life: *"trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon."* Francis said of his brothers, that they *"should beware lest they be angry or troubled on account of the sins of others, because anger and trouble impede charity in themselves and in others."* (St. Francis' Rule of 1223, Chapter 7.) Jesus said to Jairus, who thought he had lost his daughter, *"Do not be afraid, have faith"* (Mark 5:36.) May he make us courageous instruments of peace and justice, and show us what is ours to do to heal our beloved country.

Fair Trade for workers, families and the environment

On October 13, I facilitated a chocolate tasting at the Church where my fraternity meets, St. Catherine of Sienna in Norway, ME. It ran two hours on a Sunday afternoon, hosted by the Social Justice and Peace Commission of the parish. I gave them a presentation on how chocolate was made, and how the conditions of the workers, most of whom make about \$1 a day, could be improved, not only wages, but their human dignity and their families' social stability and health of the environment, through fair trade practices. In other words, ecological justice, as described in Laudato Si. It is not always easy to get on the calendar of a busy parish, but chocolate is a strong lever! So, how is your fraternity's parish doing on care for creation? If it is very active, let's share the examples. If it isn't, perhaps it is waiting for you to initiate something.
